DOCTORS

Under the *Public Health Act 2010* and Regulation, doctors are required to notify the following diseases

URGENT: BY PHONE as soon as possible

- Avian Influenza
- Creutzfeldt-Jakob disease (CJD) variant
- Foodborne illness (greater than 2 linked cases)
- Gastroenteritis (in an institution)
- Measles
- Middle East respiratory syndrome coronavirus (MERS-CoV)
- Monkeypox
- Severe Acute Respiratory Syndrome (SARS)
- Smallpox
- Viral haemorrhagic fevers

ROUTINE: By Phone or Mail

NOTIFICATION MECHANISMS

Please initiate case notification within 24 hours of diagnosis

Notifications should be directed to the local Public Health Unit except for HIV which is reported on the HIV Notification form directly to Communicable Diseases Branch, NSW Ministry of Health.

Doctors and hospital chief executive officers (or their delegate) should provide information specified in the Doctor/Hospital Notification form, either by telephone or in writing.

All notifications are strictly confidential

In order to protect patient confidentiality, notifications should only be made by facsimile machine to a designated public health unit line.
